¹Moses was keeping the flock of his father-in-law Jethro, the priest of Midian; he led his flock beyond the wilderness, and came to Horeb, the mountain of God. ²There the angel of the LORD appeared to him in a flame of fire out of a bush; he looked, and the bush was blazing, yet it was not consumed. ³Then Moses said, 'I must turn aside and look at this great sight, and see why the bush is not burned up.' ⁴When the LORD saw that he had turned aside to see, God called to him out of the bush, 'Moses, Moses!' And he said, 'Here I am.' ⁵Then he said, 'Come no closer! Remove the sandals from your feet, for the place on which you are standing is holy ground.' ⁶He said further, 'I am the God of your father, the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob.' And Moses hid his face, for he was afraid to look at God.

⁷Then the LORD said, 'I have observed the misery of my people who are in Egypt; I have heard their cry on account of their taskmasters. Indeed, I know their sufferings, ⁸ and I have come down to deliver them from the Egyptians, and to bring them up out of that land to a good and broad land, a land flowing with milk and honey, to the country of the Canaanites, the Hittites, the Amorites, the Perizzites, the Hivites, and the Jebusites. ⁹The cry of the Israelites has now come to me; I have also seen how the Egyptians oppress them. ¹⁰So come, I will send you to Pharaoh to bring my people, the Israelites, out of Egypt.' ¹¹But Moses said to God, 'Who am I that I should go to Pharaoh, and bring the Israelites out of Egypt?' ¹²He said, 'I will be with you; and this shall be the sign for you that it is I who sent you: when you have brought the people out of Egypt, you shall worship God on this mountain. ¹³'But Moses said to God, 'If I come

to the Israelites and say to them, "The God of your ancestors has sent me to you", and they ask me, "What is his name?" what shall I say to them?' ¹⁴God said to Moses, 'I AM WHO I AM.' He said further, 'Thus you shall say to the Israelites, "I AM has sent me to you." ' ¹⁵God also said to Moses, 'Thus you shall say to the Israelites, "The LORD, the God of your ancestors, the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob, has sent me to you": This is my name for ever, and this my title for all generations.

Nec Tamen Consumebatur – The Idea of The Holy - Listening to God through our environment.

The motto of the Presbyterian churches throughout the world (including Aotearoa New Zealand) is, 'Nec Tamen Consumebatur', Latin for, 'It was not consumed' – referring to the burning bush in Exodus 3:2. Let me recap the story, which I believe is enlightening for our times.

Moses was keeping the flock of his father-in-law Jethro, the priest of Midian; he led his flock beyond the wilderness, and came to Horeb, the mountain of God. There the angel of the LORD appeared to him in a flame of fire out of a bush; he looked, and the bush was blazing, **yet it was not consumed**.

One of the most fascinating stories in the whole Bible. It is about a man (Moses) encountering 'The Holy' and the indescribable – through a

burning bush. It is an experience which I believe many people have – although they might not use Biblical language to describe that encounter. I hope I can explain that better as we go through this brief reflection.

In 1917, a German philosopher and theologian called Rudolf Otto published an important book called, 'The Idea of the Holy'. It's a book that's influenced a good number of theologians from both Protestant and Catholic churches –including theologians such as Lutherans Karl Barth and Paul Tillich in the 1950s and Richard Rohr, a contemporary Catholic scholar and mystic who has become very popular in our time.

In his important book, Otto conceptualized the feelings that people typically have when they have encountered the Holy.

Among the feelings people experienced were, a sense of 'awe'- feelings of 'terror and dread' - along with feelings of 'fascination and attraction'- all at the same moment.

Otto, in his book, categorizes these feelings and helps us to understand our own religious experience and the religious experience of others. 'The Holy' he referred to as, "The Numinous" or "The Mysterium". The feelings of awe and dread he called the 'tremendum'. And he called the feelings of attraction - 'fascinans'. By describing these facets of a 'holy encounter' Otto has taken the craziness out of what is a very common and sane experience.

I think we all experience the 'numinous' or 'the holy' in everyday life – but in different degrees. We experience 'the holy' more significantly in moments when we have a heightened awareness of the life around us like, when we're in a small kayak at sea, or watching a sunset, or looking at an awesome mountain range, or admiring a bright flower arrangement in church, or watching the birth of a new baby. There's a sense of awe and attraction and a heightened respect for all of life.

In the Exodus story, Moses climbs Mt Horeb (already considered a sacred mountain) and feels himself drawn toward the spectacle of bush on the mountainside, that is burning but is not consumed. He feels compelled to remove his shoes, as he feels the terror and the fascination of entering the sphere of the Holy. He realises that he is standing on holy ground or living in a moment that will transform his life forever.

There, in that burning bush, Moses encounters God, or a messenger from God (an angel). Moses feels a sense of the 'Foreverness' of God, as he asks God what his (God's) name is. And God answers, 'I AM'. This is my name for ever, and this my title for all generations' (Exodus 3: 15)

As I thought of this experience and the 'Foreverness' of God some thoughts came into my mind, which helped me to capture the sense of the 'Foreverness' of God. Maybe my random thoughts will be useful to you too. 'I AM'

I AM

Before and after the Big Bang

IAM

Before and after the dinosaur

I AM

Before and after the everlasting hills

I AM

Before and after the melting of the Ice Cap

I AM

Before and after the forming of the oceans

I AM

Before and after the oldest and the mightiest kauri tree

I AM

Before and after the heavens and the earth

I AM

Before and after the COVID-19 pandemic I AM

'This is my name forever and this is my title for all generations'.

You might like to think of momentous moments in your life that you will never forget. Moments where you have felt the Foreverness of God – and felt humbled by it.

Today, the story of Moses and the burning bush suggests that if we want to hear the voice of God, or if we want to see the signs of God's presence, we need to look to our environment. Listen to what nature is telling us. Or what God is telling us through nature.

Sometimes the voice of God is not pleasant. Can you hear the voice of God in the images of an ancient sea turtle choking on a plastic bag? Can

you hear the voice of God when you see a river choked with chemical waste? Or hear the voice of God in the pungent smell of smoke from factories?

I think most New Zealanders are pretty good at listening to our environment. We appreciate the beauty of these islands we live in. We appreciate the bush and the mountains. We appreciate the two oceans that are on either side of us and we appreciate the great Southern Ocean below us.

Anyone who goes tramping in the NZ mountains falls in love with the NZ environment. And it is a kind of spiritual experience. It is as if God is saying: "I AM the indescribable feeling that you have, as you look upon the mountains and the bush. I AM the indescribable feeling you have when you look out at the vast oceans and the endless skies above. I AM the indescribable feeling you have as you look upon the beauty and intricacy of the mountain flowers and the majestic Kauri. I AM the indescribable feeling that is within you when you stand in awe of life! I AM!

Hopefully, we capture some of that sense of awe when we come to worship – but we will certainly capture it in our New Zealand environment. The good news is that there are many people listening to what the environment is telling us. We have within our parish – the St Columba's Havelock North Environmental Group – or 'SCHNEG' for short. SCHNEG is listening to what the environment is telling us – and our environment is telling us that we need to take greater care of our oceans and our native trees, birds and plants.

Our environment is telling us there is too much pollution into our rivers. Too much plastic going into our oceans and into our landfill. Further north of here, the Pacific Islands like Tuvalu and the Tokelau Islands are worried about the rising sea-levels that are eating away at their land. If the levels continue to rise, they will have to relocate to new places including NZ and Australia.

Listening to the environment is very much like listening to the voice of God or looking for the signs of God's presence.

Jesus in Mathew 6: 26 -28 clearly demonstrated how he saw the signs of God's presence in nature: "Look at the birds of the air; they do not sow or reap or store away in barns, and yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not much more valuable than they? Can any one of you by worrying add a single hour to your life. "And why do you worry about clothes? See how the flowers of the field grow. They do not labour or spin. Yet I tell you that not even Solomon in all his splendour was dressed like one of these'.

May we be as blessed as Moses and see God's burning presence in the creation around us. May it lead us to seek the liberation of all people and lead us to a Promised Land where all will find a home in God's love.
