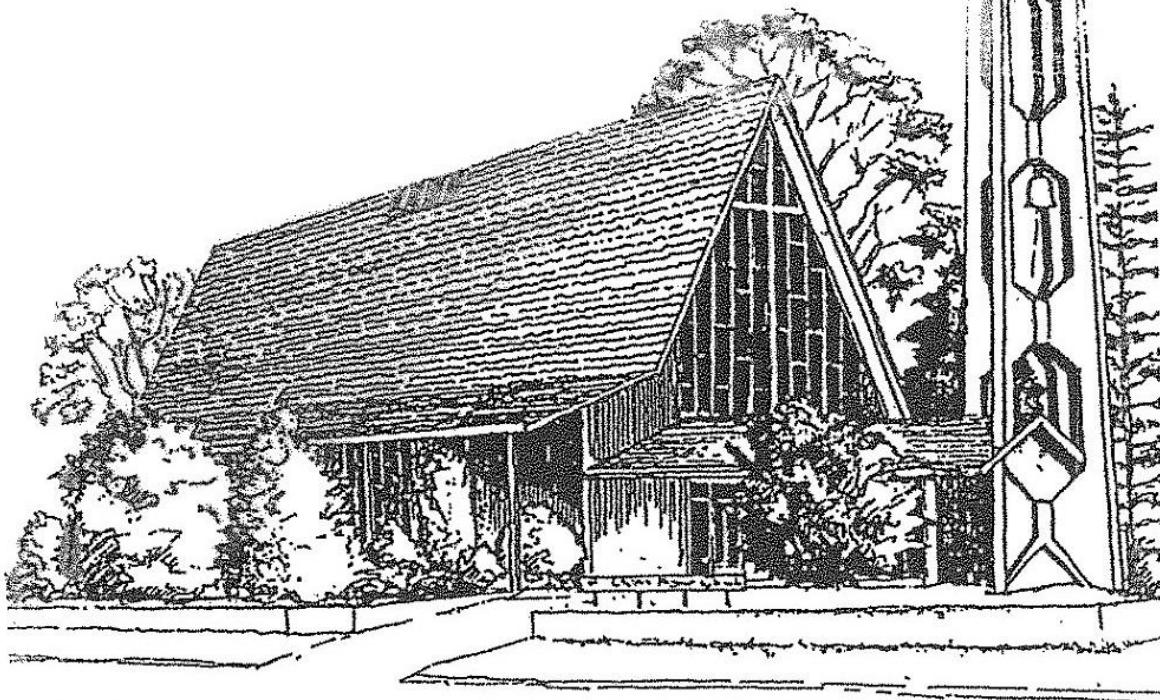

FROM THE MINISTER

Farewell to the Reverend Nolan Martin from The Bay and St Columba's, Havelock North.

By the time you read this article, the Rev Nolan Martin will have departed Havelock North, for Wellington (on Sunday 30 May) for health reasons, and to be nearer family. Nolan will be in the temporary care of his Son Ross and his wife Barbara. Eventually Nolan will move to Summerset Village Trentham, Wellington. That is the plan.

It came as quite a shock to many of us, that Nolan would be departing so soon, after his long association with Hawke's Bay. And we were disappointed that there was no opportunity to properly farewell him, or pay tribute to him.

Nolan first moved to The Bay in 1957 as minister to St Aidan's (1957 – 62), followed by 6 years at St Paul's Taupo (62 – 67). While he was there, he served as the Clerk of Presbytery. From Taupo he moved South again, to St Paul's Oamaru in 1968, and returned as minister to St Andrew's, Hastings, serving from 1986 until his retirement from parish ministry in 1991.

Even in his retirement Nolan has served as Chaplain to Presbyterian Support East Coast (PESEC) 1992 – 2008. He was also the Clerk of the Hawke's Bay Presbytery. Nolan began his long ministry as a 22 year-old student at Knox Theological Hall in 1948 - 50. What a journey!

During the ministry vacancy at St Columba's, before my arrival, Nolan stepped up once more to preaching regularly, organ playing, and leading devotions. In 2020, owing to health issues, Nolan reluctantly decided to stand down indefinitely from organ and preaching duties.

As a 'younger' minister, I have looked up to Nolan as a great example of faithful excellence in ministry. He has always been encouraging, and happy to share ideas, and references, from his extensive theological reading and reflection. I have received those insights with thanks.

We will be sad to see Nolan go.

The good news is that we will be able to catch up with Nolan at his new residence at Summerset Village Trentham, if you or I have occasion to be in Wellington.

Please continue to support Nolan with your friendship and your prayers. He still has the same cell phone number and email address. With his permission, the Church Office may also release his new address.

- Time is being made at the start of each service to welcome new members and visitors and provide an opportunity for them to introduce themselves if they feel comfortable doing so, or parishioners could introduce them from the floor.

Enjoy the recess.

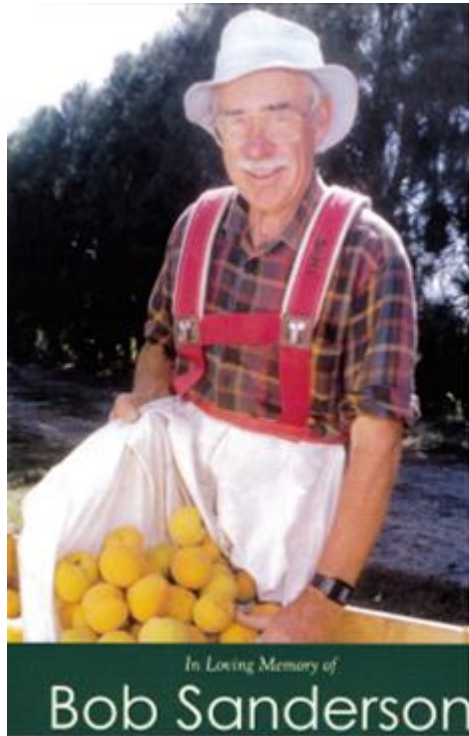

BOOK REVIEW

Helen is a great resource when it comes to good books. Thanks H. The last book I read comes from Helen via the library.

Elizabeth Strout, "Olive, Again."

Strout is an American author, winner of the Pulitzer Prize and numerous other awards for her writing. I can see why.

In this book she continues the life of her wonderful, outrageous character, Olive Kitteridge. Olive is a retired teacher living in the seaside town of Grosby, Maine. The book is full of ordinary, memorable characters she interacts with. Olive touches the lives of everyone around her.

Olive is reaching old age, married a couple of times and finally in a retirement village, where as she says, some cross the bridge to the dementia wing.

It is a story about loss, change and grappling with bodies wearing out and inevitable death and the fear that goes with it. Life is working out who we really are. Growing old is certainly not for sissies!

The novel is earthy, gritty, real and insightful into the strange lives we live. The interplay between being a "snob" and being "provincial", was delightful. I enjoyed her second husband Jack, with him flying 1st class and Olive in economy. Reading it I often found myself laughing out aloud.

Olive, as the blurb says, "is funny, wicked and remorseful, a compelling life force, a red blooded original." I just loved her and it has made me look for Sprouts first book about Olive when she was younger, titled "Olive Kitteridge". You should read this first.

A thoroughly enjoyable read and I'm sure you will enjoy it as well.

REMEMBER MAKING AN APRON IN HOME EC?

I don't think our kids know what an apron is.

The principal use of Mum's, or Granny's apron was to protect the dress underneath because she only had a few. It was also because it was easier to wash aprons than dresses and aprons used less material.

But along with that, it served as a potholder for removing hot dishes from the oven.

It was wonderful for drying tiny's tears, and was even used for cleaning out dirty ear lugs.

From the chook house, the apron was used for carrying eggs, fussy chicks, and sometimes half-hatched eggs to be finished in the warming oven.

When visitors came, those aprons were ideal hiding places for shy kids.

And when the weather was cold, Granny wrapped it around her arms.

Those big old aprons wiped many a perspiring brow, bent over the hot wood stove.

Wood chips and kindling were brought into the kitchen in that apron. From the garden, it carried all sorts of vegetables.

After the peas had been shelled, it carried out the shells to the garden compost heap.

In the Autumn, the apron was used to bring in apples that had fallen from the trees.

When unexpected guests came up the path, it was surprising how much furniture that old apron could dust, in a matter of seconds.

When tea was ready, Granny walked out onto the porch, waved her apron, and the men folk knew it was time to come in from the paddocks for tea.

It will be a long time before someone invents something that will replace that 'old-time apron' that served so many purposes.

... and remember?

Granny used to sit her hot apple pies on the window sill to cool.

Her granddaughters sit theirs on the window sill to thaw.

They would go nuts now, trying to figure out how many germs were on that apron!

We were able to explore all the grounds and Rex gave Helen MacArthur some advice on pruning apple trees in the old orchard. About three weeks after our return home, we had the loveliest letter from Helen, inviting us to stay again as friends, when we next come down to Christchurch.
