## FROM THE MINISTER

<sup>17</sup> How precious to me are your thoughts, God! How vast is the sum of them!
<sup>18</sup> Were I to count them, they would outnumber the grains of sand when I awake, I am still with you. *Ps 139: 17 & 18*

Just recently I watched a news item on TV about rising funeral cost.

The news item made me think of how funerals have changed, especially since the COVID-19 emergencies, when funerals were restricted to smaller numbers of people, and where cremation was often the first option, followed by a memorial service. Sometimes no memorial service was held.

Other social changes have changed the shape of funerals. Most people in Aotearoa NZ do not belong to a church. There are more and more secular services, often taken by a celebrant, or by members of the family (without the involvement of clergy, or celebrants). Even religious people are opting for the latter. A ministry colleague who celebrated the lives of hundreds in his long ministry, opted to have no funeral for himself and was cremated almost immediately after his death. I'm guessing that his family would've been involved in fulfilling his wishes.

When I started out in church ministry forty years ago, very few Pakeha would take the bodies of their loved ones to the family home. Now, that has become more common. Children are no longer 'protected' from the reality of death. The funeral, or farewell has become much more personalized. Maori and Pacific Island (and Irish, I am told) have practiced this type of farewell (Poroporoaki) for centuries.

Funerals have moved from being formal, institutional (church) events back into the hands of families, which can only be a good thing, with church funerals as an option, especially where the loved one belonged to a church.

At St Columba's, we have never turned anyone away from celebrating their lives in our church, and we never will. No church that I know of, will ever reject a request for a church funeral.

Where a celebrant is used, the minister and priests in the Roman Catholic and Anglican Churches, will also be involved in the service, particularly where that person was a member of their flock.

A bit of a morbid topic to be mentioning, but one that is important to all of us as we think about our own mortality and how our families will deal with our final farewells.

Six weeks to spiring and the warmer weather. Take good care of yourself and know that you are blessed.

# FROM THE BOARD OF MANAGERS

Coffee was stocked up following the closure of Trade-Aid, ensuring that we continue to have our favourite brews available.

The Board is considering the possibility of establishing a Financial Focus Group. This group would focus on financial planning and management strategies to ensure our church's fiscal health and sustainability.

The Board is conducting a comprehensive review of our insurance policies. Our current broker will be compared with a second broker to evaluate our insurance needs. While we must insure the manse for reinstatement, we are considering reducing the church coverage. Lowering the coverage to indemnity value could save approximately \$5,000 (GST included) on the premium, and reducing it further to demolition cover could save an additional \$4,000 to \$5,000 (GST included). This decision requires congregational approval, which will be sought at a meeting on 21 July 2024.

Our Annual General Meeting (AGM) is scheduled for October 13. The treasurer is diligently working to finalize the financial year figures by mid-July.

Managers regret to announce the resignation of Andrew Walker from the Board. We thank Andrew for his service and contributions.

The Board has moved to approve account payments for May 2024 totalling \$13,842.00 and for June 2024 totalling \$17,981. The financial statements for both months have been accepted.

Regular repairs and maintenance continue to be carried out to ensure our facilities are in good condition.

Projects:

Church Roof

Three quotes for the church roof were obtained, ranging from \$21,000 to \$95,000. We are currently evaluating these options to determine the best course of action.

Storage Shed for Minimarket
 A storage shed for the Minimarket has been purchased, and the foundation
 has been poured. This will provide much-needed storage space and help us
 organize our Minimarket operations more efficiently.

The Minimarket is currently in recess. The AGM for the Minimarket is scheduled for August.

The financial report for the Book Shop shows a complete revenue of \$36,921 for the year ending 30 June 2024, which is about \$1,000 down from last year. Given the challenging economic conditions, this is a pleasing result. It has been resolved that we will purchase a carpet cleaning machine for \$124 to maintain the shop's cleanliness and presentation.

## FROM THE CHURCH COUNCIL

Rev. Toleafoa announced that he will be stepping down from his role as Interim Moderator at St. Andrew's Waipukurau.

Rev. Toleafoa reported on the next big Presbytery Gathering, which will be held at St. Albans Church in Palmerston North on Friday, 16 August, and Saturday, 17 August. The keynote speaker is Rt. Rev. Rose Luxford, Moderator of the Presbyterian Church of Aotearoa New Zealand. Her address, titled "Authentic and Hopeful in Christ," promises to provide crucial guidance and inspiration for our journey of faith and community. Rev. Toleafoa also plans to suggest inviting Rt. Rev. Luxford to visit the Presbytery in 2025.

The minutes of the Special Congregational Meeting held on Sunday, 21 July, have been approved. The purpose of the meeting was to discuss the insurance and cover of the church building. It was agreed that the congregation authorizes the Board of Managers to insure the church building for less than full replacement value if the Board of Managers so decides. The Board is still considering several insurance options.

We are deeply grateful for the generous bequest of \$64,000 from the estate of the late Robert Stott. This substantial contribution will greatly support our ongoing and future projects. We extend our heartfelt thanks to Robert Stott's family for this meaningful gift.
