FROM THE MINISTER TIME – WHERE HAS IT GONE ?

"There is a time for everything, and a season for every activity under the heavens." Ecclesiastes 3: 1

Time has a funny way of running away on us. Before we know it, another year has passed, another birthday is approaching, or another Christmas is looming. Where does the time go?

As I write, I'm sharply aware that we will soon be in the last quarter of 2024. The Season of Advent, often seen as the run-up to Christmas, will begin on the first Sunday of December.

Between 4 and 6pm on that first Sunday of Advent, we will be staging our Annual Carols on The Green on the Havelock North Village Green. Performers including The Bay Cities' Symphonic Band, Men In Black Jazz Band, Opera singer Diane Abraham, and groups from Iona College and Hukarere College, who all will offer us a relaxing afternoon of music. Santa will pay a visit with some gifts for the children.

December will be a busy month with Christmas 'break up' functions for schools, clubs and other organisations. We, at St Columba's, will be busy with our end-of-year Mini Market (7th Dec) and the Christmas services.

Looking back over the year, I think we can be satisfied with what the Parish has achieved. I believe we have maintained a mission focus: We have started some new groups which meet a need in the community: The Balance & Exercise Group; The Knit and Natter Group; A Spirituality Group; A Singing Group; A Parish Focus Group which has held activities for younger families like the movie night; The Blessing of Pets Service and soon, a Craft activity with Arohanui Church. We offer some financial support to other organisations in our community. Our iconic Columba Bookshop continues to engage with the community. We support Trudi and Dick Robinson in their hands-on support of Cyclone Victims.

I, and your Elders continue to support people in need, once we hear about them. I also conduct regular services at Mary Doyle and Duart Hospital. I hope to be part of an ecumenical team that can offer services to the new James Wattie Village. I also do the odd Chapel service at Iona College in support of their chaplain.

Many of you reading this newsletter, are in retirement villages, rest homes, or house bound. We are still thinking of you. If you want a visit from me, or an Elder, we will do

our best to oblige. We have at least 18 parishioners in our parish over the age of 90. You are our parish 'taonga' (Maori for 'treasure').

I want to thank everyone in our parish for your support of the parish during the year. It's been a pleasure being your minister. The sad part of any ministry is watching much-loved parishioners pass away, or move away, reminding us that there is a time for everything under the heavens. May God be with our families who have lost loved ones during the year.

As we approach the last quarter of 2024, I pray that we will fulfil our mission of 'Making Jesus Christ known' in our Church and in our wider community. And that we do this, not by Bible bashing, but by being a loving and welcoming church, living in the Spirit of Jesus Christ.

FROM THE ELDERS

Pastoral Care: There is an increasing need for more pastoral carers within the parish. Elders are encouraged to promote and initiatives to ensure all community members receive the care and attention they need.

Acknowledgement of Rev. Wayne: Rev. Wayne Toleafoa was warmly thanked for his dedicated service and contributions to both the parish and the broader community.

SCHNEG Mission Statement: The SCHNEG group is finalizing a mission statement. Karen Armstrong will be the guest speaker at their next meeting, noted for her engaging and insightful presentations.

Focus Group Activity: The next planned event is an intergenerational pet and animal blessing service, scheduled for Sunday, 29 September.

Elders' Meeting Time: It was agreed to change the time of future elders meetings to 7:00 pm, effective from October 2024.

Communion at Mary Doyle: Anne Keown continues to serve communion to Eunice Hope after the passing of Kath Craig.

Singing for Peace Service: A "Singing for Peace" service is proposed for 6 November to commemorate the Invasion of Parihaka. Rev. Wayne and Anne Keown will organize the event, inviting various singing groups to participate.

FROM THE BOARD OF MANAGERS

Pastoral Concerns: Rev. Wayne expressed concerns for several parishioners, while the Board expressed regret at the passing of Peter Kidd, a long-serving and valuable member.

Insurance and Property: It was unanimously decided to reinstate full replacement cover for the church property. The committee will continue monitoring appropriate insurance coverage based on cost and risk. The church received an account of \$19,864 for the property insurance.

Financial Matters:

- Account payments for July 2024, totalling \$12,421, and August 2024, totalling \$15,451, were approved.
- David McDonald presented a paper to assist with investment options for the Wellington funds. The parish must distinguish between capital funds (from property sales) and parish funds (which can be used for operational expenses). St Columba's capital funds are currently held in the Presbyterian Investment Fund (PIF), which can only be used for property-related services.
- A subcommittee is considering investment options.

Stott Legacy Investment: It was resolved to invest \$65,000 for six months at a 5.6% interest rate with Westpac.

Charity Outreach: The Bookshop AGM resolved to donate 10% of funds, totalling \$3,690, to St Columba's Gabrielle Relief Fund. However, concerns were raised about the transparency of fund management, particularly regarding receipts and expenditure.


INDOOR BOWLS

OUR FUNERAL POLICY

(1) As a general rule, our parish minister, the Rev Wayne Toleafoa, will officiate at funerals held in our church. There may be occasional exceptions where the family request that a different minister officiate. In such cases a request must be made to the Rev Toleafoa who has the discretion whether to grant the request. It is emphasised that these would be only occasional instances and that the normal rule is that the proper person to officiate at a service in the church is the parish minister. Normally, it would not be considered appropriate that the church be used as a venue for funerals conducted by lay celebrants.

(2) All enquiries relating to the availability of the church for funerals need to be addressed to the church office (phone 877 8096) office hours 9:00 – 1:00, Monday – Friday, or the Office Administrator, Elma Pienaar, after hours (phone 02102773099).

(3) As a general rule, the church organ will be played at funerals by our charge organist, Jean Jarvis, or one of our other organists. There may be occasional exceptions where the family request a different organist. In such cases a request must be made to the parish minister, who has the discretion whether to grant the request, and who will decide after conferring with our charge organist. It is emphasised that these would be only occasional instances.

(4) The following charges apply for the use of the church for funerals as from 14 September 2022:

FEE FOR THE USE OF THE CHURCH

a) Where the deceased is a communicant or an associate member of the parish **No charge**

b) Where the deceased is neither a communicant nor an associate member of the parish and the funeral is conducted by the parish minister or by an outside minister with the agreement of the parish minister - **\$400.00 + GST**

c) Where the funeral is conducted by a lay celebrant - \$700.00 + GST

a) Where the deceased is a communicant or an associate member of the parish and the funeral is conducted by the parish minister, or the minister's nominee should the minister be unavailable. **No charge**

b) Where the deceased is a communicant or an associate member of the parish and the funeral is conducted, by request of the family, by an outside minister with the agreement of the parish minister, any fee payable to that minister shall not be the responsibility of the parish.

c) Where the deceased is neither a communicant nor an associate member of the parish and the funeral is conducted or led by the parish minister - **\$400.00 + GST**

d) Where the deceased is neither a communicant nor an associate member of the parish and an outside minister either conducts or participates in the funeral, any fee payable to that minister shall not be the responsibility of the parish.

e) In any case, where the parish minister leads or participates in a funeral service and an outside minister also takes part, any fee payable to the outside minister shall not be the responsibility of the parish.

CYCLONE RELIEF FUND

I want to express my heartfelt thanks to everyone for your continued support, which has enabled me to help those still affected by Cyclone Gabrielle. The journey is ongoing, and many families continue to need assistance as they work to rebuild their lives.

One family lost two houses in the floodwaters at Rissington, where three homes once stood. Despite being under-insured, they are determined to return and rebuild on their land. I've been able to provide windows, doors, insulation, and particle board. After more than 18 months without power, they've finally had electricity restored. In total, we've delivered five truck and trailer loads of supplies to help them in their rebuilding efforts.

In addition to this, I've been fortunate to assist two more families by painting the interiors of their homes—free of charge, as we are house painters by trade.

Another ongoing project involves four families whose homes were left incomplete by their builders. In some cases, bedrooms still had no flooring, lining, or Gib on the walls. Thankfully, I've been able to secure donations of Gib and ply through a generous trust. Although they couldn't assist with fuel costs, the materials have made a huge difference to these families, helping them progress towards completing their homes.

Right now, I'm focusing on organizing a golf day for about 20 fathers and teenage sons as part of a mental health initiative. With the support of another trust, the event will take place at No5 Café & Lader, where participants will enjoy a round of golf followed by refreshments and a chance to gather in a conference room for conversation and support. This came in response to requests from several wives who were concerned for the well-being of their husbands and sons.

Additionally, I'm still coordinating the collection and delivery of goods to families coming out of motels or waiting to return to their homes, which are still being rebuilt. Many of these families had no insurance, so I will soon be seeking donations of furniture, washing machines, lounge suites, and other essential household items to help them get back on their feet.

Your continued support has been invaluable to these families, making a profound difference in their recovery. I sincerely thank you for your generous donations of household goods, the use of your trailer, and contributions towards petrol for my trusty vehicle. Your kindness enables me to keep this vital work going.
